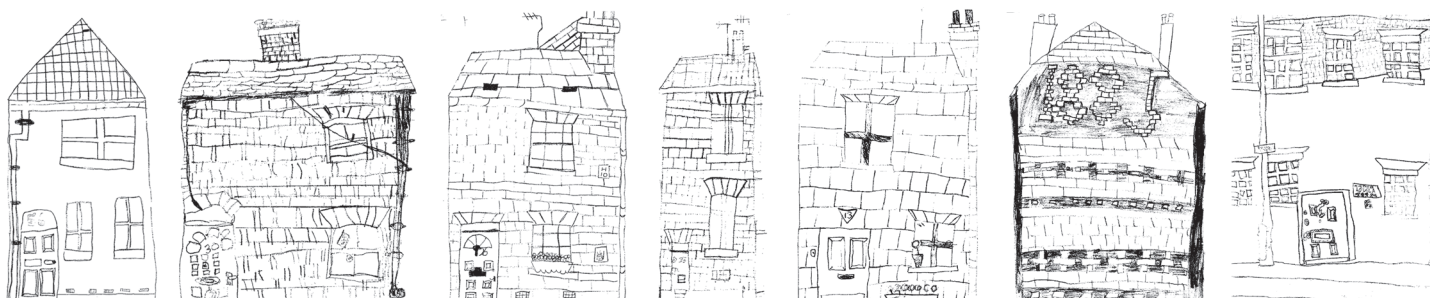

The West Oxford Academy

From Sue Hutchinson: The new West Oxford Academy starts in **October**. The idea came from a newspaper article by Hilary Gullan who had set up a university in her street in Richmond. The format was simple. Local residents would meet in her kitchen and give a brief talk on a topic that interested them; this would be followed by a discussion over a glass of wine. It would last no more than an hour.

West Oxford is full of interesting people and so I thought we should try something similar here. We meet in the Community Centre cafe on Tuesday evenings between 8pm and 9pm for two eight week terms starting in October and January. The talks - all by local residents - last up to 20 minutes and are followed by an informal discussion with a glass of wine.

I encourage people to sign up for all eight talks. The enjoyment comes from getting to know our neighbours and discovering why someone finds a topic fascinating. You never know - you may develop a previously unsuspected talent.

It is impossible to pick out a favourite talk from the past four terms; each time I have turned up slightly tired at the end of a long day only to be engaged, enlightened and entertained. Every speaker's enthusiasm for the their subject has been infectious. It is often the case that the less I know about a subject the more interesting I've found the talk and discussion. I go along thinking "How can that possibly be interesting?" only to find out that it is! One reason it was called an Academy was to encourage people to be actively involved - not just in listening to talks and in discussion but also by offering to give a talk too. It has been particularly gratifying when regular attendees have contributed.

A BIT OF LOCAL HISTORY

The Castle Mound

After the Norman Conquest in 1066, William the Conqueror set about consolidating his victory and keeping the natives in order by building castles throughout England. Robert D'Oilly, one of William's trusted knights, built Oxford castle in the 1070s. School children learn that the native Anglo-Saxons was forced to help build castles by chucking spades of earth into a central mound like a giant sandcastle. But the recent excavations carried out by the Oxford Archaeological Unit show this is not quite true. According to their research, the mound was created first by piling up local soil and then gravel. This provided a key for the final layer of local Oxford clay which would have made a slippery surface –making it difficult for enemies to scale and attack the keep built on top. The grassy surface you see today is more than 900 years of wind-blown soil which last year's exceptional rainfall caused to part company with the original clay surface resulting in the landslide. Excavations have also revealed two sides of the 12th century stone shell keep that replaced the original timber keep.
