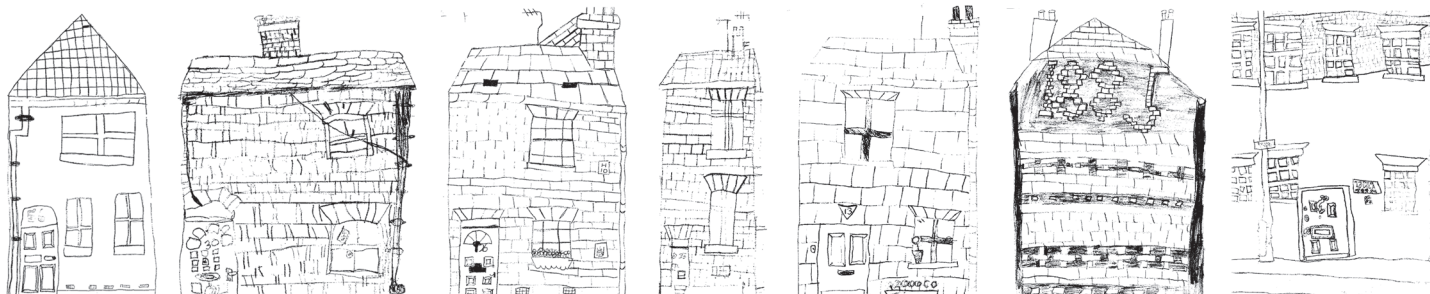

NEWS AND VIEWS

In the second of our features on long term Osney Residents, **Joyce Chalmers interviews Vera Miles.**

Almost everyone will have seen Vera walking up Bridge or East Street. She is a great walker and although she does not have a dog now, she says that walking her dog in the past has always been one of her greatest pleasures.

Vera is one of Osney's longest residents, having moved here from Portsmouth in 1936, when she was 11 years old because her father had recently been hired into the Post Office and was given a position in Oxford. Her family consisted of her father, her mother and her brother, Bill, 17 months older than Vera. They came to Osney Island and rented the house she is still in today. Vera remarked that renting was usual in those days because very few people could afford to own their own homes.



When war broke out in 1939, Vera's father went into the military again. Vera was then 14 years old and went to work, first at a local Post Office and then for the City Council Treasury Department, where she stayed for her entire career. She did want to join the WRENS but

accepted that not everyone in the family could go to war. In the end, the security she gained from her job with the council gave her the opportunity to buy her house from the landlord sometime during the 60s which was a big step for a single woman to take in those days.

Sadly, in 1980 Vera's father died and 48 hours later, so did her brother Bill. It was a sad time for herself and her mother, contending with the unhappiness of a double funeral. She said her mother never did get over the shock.

Vera, of course, like anyone who has been here so long, notes many changes here. She particularly remarked that in days gone by, everyone knew everyone (which, of course to a large degree still holds true here today). She also noted that when someone died people rallied round to give money for flowers and whatever was needed at the time. And since telephones were rare, there was a lot of popping into each other's houses, making for a different atmosphere than our present times. Since the community here boasted shops, several pubs, a bakery and an off-licence, the Island was more self sustained than today. But she agrees it is still a most lovely place to live.

A word of warning

From Anna Truelove: Early in 2010, I encountered a plumbing emergency: my Fordham WC cistern installed in 1973 had packed up and water was gushing out of the overflow pipe outside my back door. Given the emergency, there was no time to ring round looking for personal recommendations on plumbers, so I looked in the telephone directory for local plumbers and happened on a large ad placed by K. Barrett with an address in Dean Court, Botley. Mr Barrett offered a full range of plumbing, heating and drainage services with a discount for pensioners...

I rang the landline and explained the situation. In due course, Mr Barrett rang back and sent along two plumbers (one would have been enough) to replace the defective cistern. The charge was £470 which struck me as excessive. When I queried the bill, Mr Barrett became aggressive and demanded payment in cash.

I was unhappy with the cost and quality of the service and complained to Oxfordshire Trading Standards. I was told that Trading Standards had received a number of complaints about Mr Barrett who it seems also advertises electrical, flooring and gardening services. My conclusion is that he operates as a gang master called on a number of skilled or unskilled freelance workers. BEWARE!

The response from Trading Standards is: Don't deal on the doorstep. Never enter into a contract with someone buying, or selling goods or services at the door. Call 0845 051 0845 for advice. Trading Standards also offer a list of approved traders.

A BIT OF LOCAL HISTORY

Chimney sweeps

From Roy Hoare; Chimney sweeps planting sooty kisses on blushing brides was once considered good luck, but now it is a custom of the past, as both parties are rather rare. No longer are the few remaining sweeps the grimy individuals with cloth cap and overalls but clinically white-coated operatives who vacuum away every smut.

Before 1864, their predecessors, the Sweep Masters and their journeymen employed climbing boys to shin up flues and brush down the soot. These climbing boys and some girls were taken into so-called apprenticeships upon payment of perhaps 5 guineas to the parents, whereupon the child would become the property of the Sweep Master. An item in Jackson's Oxford Journal of 16th Nov. 1764 shows that John Lay, apprentice to Richard Dormer, had absconded and a reward of half-a-crown (25p in today's money) was offered for his return. The article gave his full description and forbade anyone to harbour or entertain him.

The so-called apprenticeship consisted of a brief period of watching, then being thrust into the flue with an experienced boy behind; any reluctance on the part of the 'tyro' would prompt the slapping or pricking of his feet. The discomfort and horrific conditions they experienced resulted in scrapes, burns, sore eyes and constant chest infections. In their later years many suffered from cancers of the lips and scrotum, which was known as the sweeps cancer and rarely seen elsewhere.

Major accidents were commonplace. In March 1813 an eight-year-old boy named Pitt became firmly stuck in a chimney that had only recently been extinguished. After part of the chimney had been demolished, he was found to be dead and his elbows and knees had been burnt to the bone. These incidents were deemed to be accidental deaths. A law was passed in 1864 to end this horrendous practice but not without some opposition in Government. One noble enquired, 'How would I know that my chimneys were being swept properly?'

In the early 17th century Italians from Piedmont came to England to work as sweeps. Today, in the first week of September each year, hundreds of chimney sweeps meet at Santa Maria Maggiori in Piedmont. A brotherhood of sweeps meet to drink, and generally 'whoop it up'. A museum to their profession was opened there in 1975 and has become their Mecca. It also serves as a memorial to the many children who endured such suffering.
