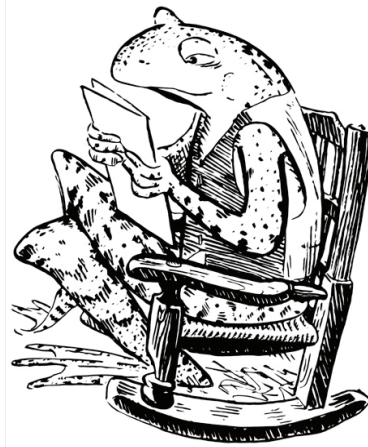

### Looking out for others

*From Georg Deutsch, Chair:* Most people in Oxford will have heard about the Cowley case: over a number of years a group of adolescent girls were subjected to terrible abuse, including rape and torture. Social services and the police apparently knew about it for years, but did not act upon the information they had. However, there was a third group which is said to have known what went on, but kept their eyes shut. This was the public or more specifically, the 'local community'.

This brings me to the purpose of my contribution. I believe it is the moral duty of a 'local community' to protect its most vulnerable members, such as children, adolescent boys and girls, and the elderly. This should not be confused with snooping on one's neighbour or with busy bodies telling other people how to conduct their personal affairs. It is – to use a rather old fashioned term – about compassion, perhaps only to keep one's eyes wide open. What happened in Cowley could have happened anywhere in this city. We, as residents in this place, have to make sure that it does not happen on the island.

## A BIT OF LOCAL HISTORY

For the past few years Roy Hoare has regularly contributed his very popular local history column. However, Roy feels it's time to hand the baton over to someone else so this is his last piece.

### The Covered Market

*From Roy Hoare:* The market is an oasis of interest away from the bustle of pedestrians and convoys of buses on the High. Visitors to Oxford who have found their way into the old place - the entrances are not too obvious - will hold it in their memory as one of the highlights of their visit to our city.

The Covered Market was built in 1772 and designed by John Gwynn, who was also the architect of Magdalen Bridge. The purpose was to centralize the sprawl of market traders from along the roads leading from Carfax, where they caused congestion and pollution, especially the butchers and fishmongers. A committee of twelve was formed to manage it, six from the city and six from the university. William Tubb was the first Beadle, receiving 10s. a week for 'wage and administration'.

Extensions were built in 1808 and the roof was added in 1874. Initially there were 40 butchers, followed by stalls for fishmongers, greengrocers and mercers. The Alden family was among the first group of butchers. Originally from America, they came to live in Chipping Norton in the mid 18th century trading in cattle and butchery. They continued to trade in the market until the 21st century when they moved to Osney Mead where they still run a fine butchery. As time progressed the number of stall holders increased and by 1892 there were over 100.

In its early days, the arena was used for other events. On the 17th July 1783, two men were tried for some minor local mischief and ordered to stand in the pillory for two hours and fined £10. In July 1785, a man was publicly whipped for stealing a shirt. Perhaps one of the most bizarre incidents, as recorded in Jackson's Oxford Journal in 1879, was "About noon on Wednesday last, a vulgar mode of divorce lately adopted, was put into practice in our new market place, before a multitude of witnesses, Richard Hawkins, a canal navigator-man, made public sale of his wife to William Gibbs, a mason employed at works of the Castle. The price was 5s. Whereupon the wife walked off quite eagerly with her new partner." In September 1980 rings and watches were stolen from Gowrings the jewelers. The thieves smashed three holes in the roof and used a hook to fish out the loot.

Over the years there has been considerable friction regarding Council rent rises. In 2008, so excessive increases threatened to send many traders out of business. A petition organised by the Conservative Party caused the City Council to re-consider its rental policy. The current controversy relates to Sunday opening over which the Council have levied a blanket 10% rise in rentals whether or not the trader will open.

### **What's that smell of burning?**

When I first moved to Oxfordshire I lodged with a family in Wheatley. In the summer months my landlord cooked on a barbecue every night. He lit the charcoal around 4 or 5 and by early evening it had turned to glowing embers. On these he grilled meat or fish, boiled pans of vegetables, baked sweetcorn or potatoes. No smoke, no flames, no firelighters, no fuss.

I often think of those quiet suppers as evening descends on Osney. Each year we long for some ideal of summer – the sunlit days and balmy nights we anticipated all winter. We picture ourselves in the garden with a cool glass of wine, eating al fresco as the light fades. But on any evening that starts to hint at warmth, a pall of barbecue smoke envelops the island. I have come to dread the stench of paraffin and burnt flesh, the British habit of blitzing sausages on flaming charcoal. It is a far cry from the appetising scent of gently grilled meat that I remember.

How odd it is that in this 'smokeless zone' our most beautiful evenings are polluted by the fallout from burning burgers. Why do the British love a barbecue? And why do we do it so badly?

### **Telephonic Scams**

*From Anna Truelove:* Years ago I signed up to the Telephonic Preference Service, which does its best to block unwanted cold marketing calls – but it can't stop all of them. I understand that, for instance, computer-generated calls slip through.

Recently I was contacted by a guy purporting to represent the Telephone Preference Service. Foreign-sounding Jesse asked for details of my credit card – in particular the long number on the front so that it could be 'encrypted'. I would then be given a password to protect me from further cold callers...??? I resisted blandishments from Jesse and his supervisor and when I asked for their telephone number to ring them back they hung up. The Telephone Preference Service (0845 0700 707) confirmed that this is a scam and one they can't deal with. I subsequently rang Thames Valley Police on 101 to report this approach and the helpful respondent advised also contacting [www.actionfraud.police.uk](http://www.actionfraud.police.uk) – an effective Government-sponsored website. As an e-averse person, I rang ActionFraud (0300 123 2040).

Tips for dealing with questionable cold callers:

Say at the outset, 'I am TPS-registered' (if you are). A bona fide caller should then apologise and ring off. If the caller persists, beware.

Ask for their telephone number; ring off if it's not forthcoming.

And mistrust anybody who asks for payment in untraceable UKash vouchers!
