The Flying Scotsman

From Richard Thurston: Flying Scotsman, the first steam locomotive recorded to have run at 100 mph, visited Oxford in August. Built in 1923 to haul express trains along the East Coast mainline from London Kings Cross, she was retired from regular service in 1963 after travelling just over two million miles. During her service career, a visit to Oxford would have certainly been unusual, but after being preserved, Flying Scotsman travelled much further, heading to the USA and even Australia. The name 'Flying Scotsman' was originally the unofficial name for the train services between London and Edinburgh which departed simultaneously, leaving at 10 o'clock. In 1924, the operator of the railway line, the London and North Eastern Railway Company, named the locomotive after the train service. Ten years later, Flying Scotsman achieved 100mph, the first steam locomotive to do so. During her 1989 Australia tour, she set another record: the longest non-stop run ever by a steam locomotive - travelling 442 miles during a run from Melbourne to Alice Springs. Ganesh Chaturthi

This autumn, those of us living in North St/top end of East St were treated to the spectacular festival of Ganesh Chaturthi which honours the birth of the Hindu elephant-headed god, Lord Ganesha. This god is worshipped for his ability to remove obstacles and bring good fortune. The festival with boisterous devotees and lots of loud drumming ended up by the river at the North St /East St junction. Traditionally, local communities compete with each other to put up the most impressive Ganesha statue and display.



Allotment news

From Jude Carroll: This month (November 2019), most allotment concerns and activities are focussed on water. Anyone who visited Twenty Pound Meadow on 11 November would have found plot holders putting plots to 'bed' for the winter. Some might have been reflecting back on the last growing season or, in some cases, planting garlic and broad beans for 2020. I was turning over beds and marvelling at the earthworms. Then the water came in. Within hours, for the first time in more than five years, plots were under water, as was most of the West Oxford land north of the Botley Road. In Twenty Pound Meadow, we were surrounded - the river roared through Tumbling Bay, water seeped up from the ground in the plots along the river and it kept coming from the sky. By the end of the week newcomers had seen their hard work reduced to flotsam and 'old hands' were reassuring them that recovery is possible, depending on how long things stay under water. Ironically, the day the water came in was also the day we collected six donated water storage units from the Botanical Gardens. These six can serve as decanting vessels for moving collected water into two huge barrels, designed to store rainwater and eventually, to collect river water and feed it into watering troughs. The plan is to replace mains water with something more sustainable and we are now ready to move collecting barrels to high platforms and plumb them into the current system. It's hard to remember that dry times will come - though we know they will. Whatever happens, we are grateful for all the care and attention from the many people - including Mark, our Osney lock keeper - who are trying to keep the water moving through.

Osney hydro – and a plea for broken china

From Barbara Hammond: We are now well into our 5th year of operation and after a very frustrating start - 6 months of drought from May 2015! - we have established a good pattern of operation around our average of 188,000 units of electricity generated each year. This is enough to power the annual usage of around 57 typical Osney homes.

With all the wet weather since September, we have had a great start to the winter generating season. But now we are into a period of too much water and you will see that the hydro is going very slowly at the moment. This is because the drop over the weir has pretty much disappeared and so there is very little gravity to turn the screw.

As well as the generation of zero carbon electricity, we are also seeing the growing importance of the educational side of the project. So far in 2019 we have had over 800 visitors to the site including the Lord Mayor of Oxford, the Shadow Energy Minister and the House of Commons Science and Technology Committee.

Next summer, we hope to complete the landscaping of the site, so that we can open it to the public during the day and people can really start to use it as a garden for Osney. As part of this, we are developing a human sundial project and have a local artist making mosaics of local flora and fauna for it. So, we are on the hunt for fragments of china that have turned up in local gardens and allotments to incorporate into the artwork. If you've dug up a fragment of an old plate digging up your spuds, or found a chip of patterned pottery weeding the dahlias we'd love them for our project. Ideally fragments should be flat and relatively thin - patterned items particularly welcome. All fragments hugely appreciated, although apologies in advance if your donation doesn't make it into the finished mosaic, as the pieces used this will be determined by the colour scheme of the final design.

FixMyStreet

From Alan Goodwin: FixMyStreet is a map-based website and app that makes it really easy and quick to tell their Council (Oxford or Oxfordshire in our case) about problems needing their attention, such as potholes, broken streetlamps, etc. If it isn't actually a Council problem, they can refer it to the relevant utility company or whatever. I used it for the first time recently to report a broken streetlight and a smashed electricity cable cover in North Street. Both had been problems for a while and nothing seemed to be happening, but both were fixed almost immediately once I reported them on FixMyStreet, and I got email updates (optional) during the whole process. An added benefit is that using FixMyStreet saves our hard-
